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MESSAGE FROM THE COUNTRY DIRECTOR

It is with a deep sense of accomplishment that I present the 2022 annual report to the world despite the many challenges of global and national scale that threatened the achievement of operational and business goals.

The full-blown war in Ukraine heightened the disruption in global value chain with a significant impact on energy and food distribution. This resulted in increased interest rates causing a spike in the unabating inflation crisis which further deepens poverty levels especially in developing countries including Nigeria; a potential set-back in our fight against poverty.

Natural disasters across the world coupled with the global economic impact of post Covid-19 pandemic period has also meant depleting resources for development work as funding priority is given to the immediate humanitarian needs of affected countries. I cannot but mention the rising scale of insecurity in the North-west of Nigeria causing an unprecedented humanitarian need in the region, and flooding disasters with devastating effect on food security, and the country's development at large.

In the face of these numerous challenges, we remained committed to achieving our vision of a Nigeria without poverty. With the poor and vulnerable as our driving force, we were undeterred and stayed as motivated as ever to keep up the pace in the fight to subdue poverty and ultimately create a just and equitable society.

To cross these hurdles, we consistently devised innovative approaches to ensure our interventions are efficiently delivered to reach the most marginalised of affected populations. This is evident in the remarkable successes we documented across all our workstreams in 2022. We delivered life-changing interventions in 15 states and the FCT that cut across Climate Action, Livelihood Support, Food and Nutrition, Water Sanitation and Hygiene, Good Governance, and Health, directly reaching **278,377** persons, while **4,015,580** persons were reached indirectly.

This feat was not achieved alone. Our work with funded and non-funded partners, governments at national, state, and local levels including different government agencies had an incredible impact on the delivery of our programmes and we remain grateful for the commitment, dedication and passion demonstrated by all towards seeing a better Nigeria. I sincerely commend all our partners for their trust and commitment to working with us to reach those in extreme poverty.

The year 2023 is another opportunity to make history together. As Nigeria transits into a new administration, it is our hope that the newly elected and appointed leaders will take over the baton of championing the cause of the vulnerable, marginalised, and poorest of the poor.

As a development and humanitarian organisation working in Nigeria, we will continue to stay true to our vision and will not relent in pushing the boundaries alongside those we serve. Most importantly, I thank colleagues at Christian Aid Nigeria who worked tirelessly to ensure we deliver on our core mandate.


Our **MISSION**







GENDER JUSTICE





The Side-by-Side movement for Gender Justice has enabled Christian Aid to strategically engage Faith and Traditional leaders who use their religious and traditional platforms to advocate for gender justice in Lagos, Ondo, Ekiti, Kano, Imo, Anambra, Kaduna states and the FCT. These continue to influence the beliefs and cultural perspective of their followers towards behaviour change. This effort was supported with capacity building and sensitisation activities which included:

Capacity of 40 Christian leaders built on Strategies for Addressing Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) and Harmful Traditional Practices (HPS) in Ondo state.



Kaduna state populace educated on Gender Justice through eight (8) months engagement sensitization series.

Leveraging on this innovative approach, Christian Aid is determined to drive deep lasting changes for gender justice to the benefit of vulnerable populations, especially among poor and vulnerable women and adolescent girls in Nigeria.

TAX JUSTICE

Christian Aid continues to sustain efforts towards achieving tax justice in Nigeria by promoting simplified and localized information on taxation and tax obligations among taxpayers in targets states; a strategic way to keep more people, especially those in rural areas and vulnerable groups, informed about taxation. This increased opportunities for improved tax compliance with a view to increasing government revenues in the state for development financing; and enhanced the capacity of taxpayers to demand fairness, justice, and equity in tax administration.





hen Hope Givers Initiative (HOG-I) took its intervention on good and inclusive governance to Ebenebe Community, little did it know that a torch waiting to be lit sits at the center of the community; the Women Leader, Mrs. Favour Nworah.

Ebenebe is one of the communities that make up Akwa North Local Government Area (LGA) in Anambra State, Nigeria. The LGA is one of the marginalized in the state lacking good roads, potable water, primary healthcare center, and other social amenities. It is double marginalisation for women and girls who are subjected to early marriage and are generally excluded from decision making.

Following the community sensitisation on the impact of women exclusion in governance, Mrs Favour took the initiative to continue sensitizing women in her community on the importance of evidence-based engagement; women inclusion in decision making processes and taking up political positions. This metamorphosed to formation of a women's group named: "Nwanyi bu ife", an association of women supporting women.

The association championed messages that encourage women to support fellow women vying for for political offices. This is based on the conviction that having a female representative in power will amplify women's voices in the decision-making space towards addressing vital community needs. Led my Mrs Favour, the association took the sensitization from community to local government level and held several activities using internally mobilised resources.

BEYOND SENSITISATION

With the support of HOG-I, the women took a step further by directly engaging female political candidates for the 2023 General Elections across two senatorial zones through townhall meetings.

Based on identified alignment between their manifestoes and women's prioritised needs, the women unanimously agreed to support 2 women who demonstrated capacity to deliver: one at the local government level and the other at the federal government level.

Once again, Nwanyi bu ife women showed the world the true effect of the 'Power of the Pack' as the two female candidates adopted won the general elections. Both candidate-elects have committed to championing the course of women as they commence their regime.

With this historic success, Awka North women are confident in their abilities to effectively engage power holders. Holding on to the mantra that power lies in the people, they are ready to hold their leaders accountable and vote out politicians who do not keep their end of the bargain. Above all, they strongly believe that women's voices will be heard across Akwa North LGA.





THE POWER OF AN ENTERPRISE

he family of Hadiza and Isah Adamu lived comfortably with their seven children in Tashan-Bama, Gubori community of Jere LGA in Borno state. With a lucrative fishing business, Isah had no problems sending all his children to school.

This relative stability was not to last for long as Tashan-Bama was attacked in 2015, displacing Hadiza and her family. Welcomed into the safe and warm ambience of Malakyariri community as internally displaced persons, Hadiza's family settled in. However, a challenge remains; the daunting task of starting life all over!

"We had a rough time trying to settle down and start life over again"...Hadiza

In 2019, life took a new turn when 30-year old Hadiza was selected to participate in the livelihood intervention programme of Christian Aid and World Food Programme (WFP) being implemented in Malakyariri community. Hadiza was enrolled in the Tailoring IGA (Income Generating Activity). She took a step further by enrolling in Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) as well as a community savings forum.

Hadiza makes between N2,000 - N3,000 Naira as weekly profits from her tailoring business which she does in her house, saving her the cost of rent for a shop. She is also a beneficiary of the #17,000 Naira conditional monthly stipend of the WFP cash-out intervention.

The enterprising nature of Hadiza came into fore when she ventured into livestock farming to support her tailoring business. Using savings gotten from the VSLA and community savings forum, she has been able to buy two male rams. The first ram was purchased in August 2022, while the second was bought in September 2022. She rears the rams in her house and plans to fatten them for sale during religious celebrations. She will also get female rams to breed and increase the number of the livestock.

What is more, Hadiza can take care of her immediate household needs and pay her children's school fees at the community school they attend.

Life is looking bright again for Hadiza and her family. They have picked up the pieces and are happily stitching it back together one day at a time.

TUDUN KOFA COMMUNITY

- A Breath of Life Renews Hope

or many years, residents of Tudun Kofa community in Keffi Local Government Area of Nasarawa state suffered the brunt of inaccessible healthcare services primarily due to high out-of-pocket spendings on healthcare. This prevented many community members from seeking medical help medical help at all, while those who were able experienced a halt in services resulting from financial hardship in the process of seeking health care. This has resulted in loss of lives and health complications as community members seek unsafe alternative healthcare services.

Abubakar Wada, an active member of the community and a Person with Disability (PWD), is doubly jeopardised. Besides the obvious fact that PWDs are disadvantaged as regards mobility, they are more predisposed to the struggles of earning a living. Thus, they experience greater financial barriers in accessing healthcare services.

For Abubakar, a civil servant and father of one, his monthly earnings are too meagre to cater for his health needs. The most he could do was cater for the immediate needs of his small family while his health status remained poor. Despite his unpleasant situation, Abubakar is known as one who actively supports community interventions and a spokesperson for PWDs in the community. Hence, it was not surprising when he was selected as one of the community resource persons for the Universal Health Coverage intervention in Tudun Kofa community.

Implemented in collaboration with Nasarawa State Health Insurance Agency (NASHIA), with technical support from Christian Aid Nigeria's local partner, Development Governance International Foundation (DGIF), the project focused on increasing access to, and uptake of quality affordable basic health care for vulnerable and marginalized people in target communities of Keffi LGA, Nasarawa State.

The UHC intervention turned out to be a life changing opportunity for Abubakar as he became one of the 440 vulnerable persons directly supported to enrol into the Nasarawa State Social Health Insurance Scheme. Doubling as a community resource person and a project participant, Abubakar's health condition has improved significantly as he does not have to spend out-of-pocket and now receives quality medical care as and when needed.



"Following my enrolment and access to healthcare at Kofar Pada my health status improved because no more paying out of pocket the little received from my monthly income now helps to take care of my family needs." - Abubakar Wada

The project also provided a platform for him to give back to his community by engaging in activities aimed at improving community health. He served as a voice for Persons with Disabilities in the community as he facilitated sensitization meetings to the Association of Persons with Disabilities, advocacies to influential persons within the community for the adoption of more vulnerable persons into the health scheme, and townhall meetings despite his mobility challenges.

These efforts yielded desired result as 129 vulnerable community members were enrolled into the state health insurance scheme with cost borne by influential members of the communities, informal sector groups, and religious organizations. In addition, 57 enrolees were absorbed into the Nasarawa State Basic Health Care Provision Fund with positive feedback as regards ease of access to quality healthcare without financial hardship.

So far, over 1,000 persons have benefitted directly or indirectly from the UHC project in Tudun Kofa community. By virtue of their enrolment, Abubakar and other enrolled community members are entitled to all preventative and curative health services at the primary, secondary, and tertiary level of care in Nasarawa State.

"Whenever we are sick, regardless of the illness, we go to the facility, and they conduct proper diagnosis by conducting proper diagnosis to know if we have typhoid, ulcer, malaria, or diabetes before prescribing drugs for us without paying anything. We have never paid anything at the facility to access healthcare. All the beneficiaries under this program have never paid anything. I want to let you know that the people of the community are really excited, and they appreciate your gesture. We are also hoping that the program will be sustained to give healthcare access to the poor. We really appreciate and may God reward the sponsors of this intervention."

To ensure sustainability, the project supports persons like Abubakar to contribute money in instalments towards payment of their yearly premiums. The project also explored engagement with the Nasarawa State Insurance Agency on the absorption of some project beneficiaries on the Basic Health Care Provision Fund and Equity Fund.

The UHC project stimulated the demand for health insurance services among target groups. Results showed improved health service delivery especially in the referral system for enrolees on the vulnerability health insurance scheme. Through regular service delivery monitoring at facilities and community-led action by trained community resource persons, the project ensured accountability for healthcare service provision and utilization by the participants.
