# Climate Justice

#### What you can do

- Share a copy of the Stop Climate Chaos Scotland Manifesto with your MSPs ahead of the publication of the Scottish Government's draft Climate Change Plan.
- Send your MSPs a save the date for the Creative for Climate Justice exhibition 3-5 September.
- Call on your MP and Prospective Parliamentary Candidates to pursue climate, debt, and economic justice.

### What is climate justice?

To achieve climate justice, the most polluting countries, businesses, and individuals must pay for climate mitigation, adaptation and <u>loss and damage</u>; instead of those who have done the least to cause it. This is also known as the polluter pays principle.

When we engage with our Scottish politicians on climate justice it is important to speak of the interactions with other types of justice. Two examples of this are:

- Climate justice is linked to racial justice as many global inequalities have their roots in colonialism and slavery, which fuelled the industrial revolution, Britain's wealth, and subsequent carbon footprint. - Climate justice is linked to debt justice, this
  is because many of the poorest countries
  have unsustainable and unjust debt which
  they spend a large proportion of their GDP
  on. This restricts the finance available for
  countries to adapt, respond and recover
  when climate disasters strike. Also, <u>Climate</u>
  <u>disasters are expensive</u> making it even
  harder to make debt repayments after they
  have occurred.

# What happened at COP28?

At the UN Climate Conference (COP28), in December 2023, the big headline was that after 30 years of climate summits the conference adopted a statement, signed by all 190 nations calling on the world, to "transition away from fossil fuels". While it's a far cry from the urgent need to phase out fossil

fuels, as demanded by 130 of the most climate vulnerable states, it's the first time a COP has produced language that points to the end of the fossil fuel era. Work is needed to continue to press for urgent phasing out of oil and gas, and no new drilling.

The other big takeaway from the COP was the establishment of a <u>UN backed Loss and Damage</u> fund – a pot of money which rich nations fund to help countries on the frontline of the climate crisis recover from climate catastrophe. The UK committed to £60m, but this was repackaged money, from a pot already dedicated to tackling climate change. A long way off the £12.5bn that Christian Aid estimates would be needed.

The lack of new and additional climate finance from countries was a broader issue at COP28 across all types of finance discussed. Check out Christian Aid's blog, everything we saw at COP28 for more information.

## **Scottish Government Climate Action 2023**

At COP28 the Scottish Government continued to advocate for loss and damage funding. Additionally, during 2023 they continued to provide climate finance funding; this was through the <u>Climate</u> <u>Justice Fund</u>. Also, for the first time funding was provided by the Scottish Government from the <u>Humanitarian Emergency Fund</u> to tackle immediate loss and damage needs caused by climate disasters. Christian Aid partners have received <u>loss and damage funding for South Omo, Ethiopia</u>.

The Scottish Government's advocacy and finance is in part because of your continued campaigning in Scotland on loss and damage. You can read more about the 2023 Christian Aid loss and damage campaign in our <u>briefing</u> and blogs on <u>Make</u>

However, domestically, the Scottish Government is missing critical climate targets, including its greenhouse gas emissions target in 2023. There has also been a delay in publishing the updated Climate Change Plan which was expected in November 2023 but now will be published in Spring 2024. ## **Contacting your MSPs**

In 2023 Stop Climate Chaos Scotland released a manifesto of policies which provide the Scottish Government and UK Government policy suggestions to help them meet their climate and nature targets. Christian Aid helped to write this manifesto and we want MSPs to adopt the policies included with urgency.

We therefore need your help to keep the pressure on your MSPs to champion climate justice. You can write to them individually or as a church, there is a <u>template letter</u> if this is helpful; you can find out who your MSPs are <u>here</u>.

Points to raise with your MSPs:

- Ask the Scottish Government to maintain and expand commitments to international climate finance. More information on the specifics of this can be found in the corresponding section of the manifesto available here.
- Ask your MSPs how they are going to tackle the climate crisis in 2024 through their work and how they are going to support the Climate Change Plan. You can make this a more specific request depending on the MSP's interests and recent work, you could send them the most relevant part of the SCCS manifesto.
- Send a save the date for the <u>Creative for Climate Justice</u> exhibition 3-5 September.
   School children are developing artwork on climate justice for an exhibition at Holyrood.
   MSPs can speak to children about their art from 13:00-14:15 on the 5 September. If you know of schools that might be interested in taking part, please contact us.

## **Contacting your MP**

This year there will be a UK Government General Election and people across the UK have the opportunity to engage with their current MPs and Prospective Parliamentary Candidates (PPCs) on important issues of justice. Points to raise with your MP/PPCs:

- Call for a halt to all new oil and gas developments in the UK, and investment in good quality, secure green jobs.
- Ask for a significant increase in UK
   Government international climate funding.
   This needs to be in addition to existing UK aid
   commitments, funds should be raised in part by
   the UK Government taxing the vast profits of
   fossil fuel companies.
- Ask for the introduction of legislation to facilitate debt relief for lower-income countries in debt distress.
